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FOREWORD BY WONG CHEN



My dear Subang Constituents,

Happy New Year to all! I am pleased to present our newsletter for the final six months of 2025.

Allow me to begin this foreword by sharing my political reflections and resolution as we enter 2026.

In recent months, much has been said about the need to revive reforms, particularly after the sobering outcome faced by Pakatan Harapan parties in the recent Sabah elections. Truthfully, the reform agenda seemed to have lost its way in the past three years. Arguably, there have been some reforms though far and few, and upon closer examination, these reforms tended to be cosmetic rather than comprehensive.

This year's overriding political concern should be simple; reform or die at the upcoming polls.

The mission itself has not changed, but people have. Our task remains to curb and ultimately eliminate systemic corruption by passing meaningful, far-reaching reforms this year, and ensuring its implementation next year. Should we fail, we risk squandering the hard-won momentum of an entire generation, a movement that began with the Reformasi street protests in 1998.

The irony is not lost and the disillusionment is palpable. Malaysians must learn to remember, to remain steadfast in principle, and not have selective political amnesia for the sake of expediency.

I probably have another one and a half years left to serve you as the Member of Parliament for Subang. Elections must be held before December 2027, although this could be legally delayed for another six months into 2028. Either way, the clock is ticking.

For that reason, I am resolute in dedicating 2026 to pursuing reforms, with or without the backing of those in power. That is the essence of my new year's resolution to you, my constituents of Subang.

On the community side, my office and I remain committed to serving all constituents of Subang judiciously. We have not deviated from our perennial budget pattern with a primary focus on social, welfare and local association funding.

In 2025, our office completed all of our Projek Mesra Rakyat (PMR) which provided a funding of RM30,000 each to 52 schools, totalling RM1.56 million. We also channelled funds to various public institutions across the constituency for essential infrastructure repairs, maintenance and upgrades. Further details of these projects are contained within this newsletter.



FOREWORD BY WONG CHEN

Over the past six months, my office successfully organised a series of community programs aimed at fostering health, awareness and education among our constituents. These included two *Karnival Kesihatan* at Pangsapuri Angsana USJ 1 and Pangsapuri Enggang, alongside several festivity-based welfare initiatives for Hari Raya Aidiladha, the Mooncake Festival and Deepavali, all designed to support underprivileged communities while honoring the spirit of each celebration. We also partnered with SK Subang Jaya & SMK USJ 8 for the STI MADANI MOSTI programs, highlighting the importance of integrating science and technology into our daily lives.

We also have the construction of Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1 to look forward to. My office will continue to monitor its progress closely and provide periodic updates as the project advances. Additionally, I am pleased to share that my office will intensify efforts to ensure the establishment of another Klinik Kesihatan in Kinrara, as announced in this year's national budget.

In parallel, I will continue my diplomatic engagements as part of my duty to contribute meaningfully to Malaysia's role on the international stage. These engagements are not about prestige, but about building practical cooperation, fostering goodwill and ensuring that both my constituency and country benefit from constructive relationships abroad.

As with every edition of this newsletter, we continue our practice of full transparency by disclosing details of our parliamentary office budget for public review.

Finally, I extend my sincere appreciation to my officers, volunteers and interns for their dedication, professionalism and tireless service to the people of Subang. Their commitment enables our office to continue delivering meaningful work on your behalf.

Wishing success, prosperity and peace to Malaysia.

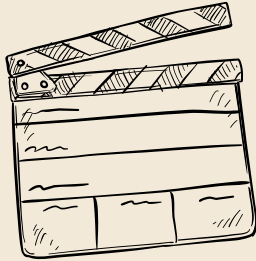

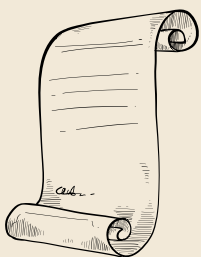

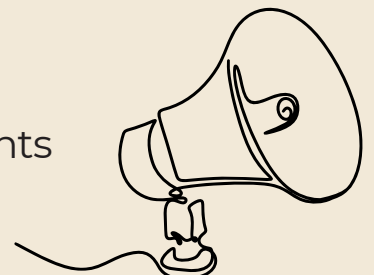

THIS TIME IN PARLIAMENT



There were two parliamentary sittings in the second half of 2025. In the June-July sitting, the Thirteenth Malaysia Plan (RMK 13) was introduced while in the October-December sitting, the National Budget for 2026 was passed. YB Wong Chen engaged in a variety of issues ranging from Urban Renewal to Orang Asli land rights throughout both sittings.

YB Wong Chen questioned an amendment of the Whistleblower Protection Act 2010, recommending the creation of a Whistleblower Protection Committee and the introduction of an Ombudsman law. In addition, he raised an emergency matter in Parliament on the attack on YB Rafizi Ramli's son.

Subsequently, YB Wong Chen has participated in press conferences in both parliamentary sittings, covering topics such as the judiciary crisis and the Urban Renewal Bill. Additionally, YB Wong Chen engaged with Orang Asli leaders in his press conference on Orang Asli Land Rights, accepting a memorandum from them.



PARLIAMENTARY QUESTIONS AND SPEECHES

July 22 - Speech on the Amendment of the Whistleblower Protection Act 2010

YB Wong Chen commented on the three main policy issues for whistleblowers and suggested the creation of a Whistleblower Protection Committee. He also highlighted how an Ombudsman law would include a more effected Whistleblower Protection Act.



July 28 – Stray Animal Abuse

YB Wong Chen asked the Ministry of Agriculture and Food Security on a national framework to address the issue of stray animal abuse. He followed up with a question on the issue of guidelines for the management of stray animals.



August 13 - Speech on the Attack on YB Rafizi Ramli's son

YB Wong Chen raised an emergency matter under Standing Order 14(1)(i) requesting the Speaker to ask the government to brief Parliament on the attack on YB Rafizi's son.

November 4 – Stance on the Myanmar Junta

YB Wong Chen asked the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on Malaysia's stance regarding the general election to be held by the Myanmar junta.



November 4 – Rohingya Refugees in Cox's Bazaar

YB Wong Chen asked the Ministry of Foreign Affairs if the government plans to fundraise for the Rohingya refugees in Cox's Bazaar along with other ASEAN countries.



December 2 - Refugee Policy

YB Wong Chen asked the Ministry of Home Affairs on the implementation plan for the Dokumen Pendaftaran Pelarian (DPP) to ensure that registered refugees have access to education and healthcare. He followed up by asking on the number of refugees that would be included in the program and how much they would have to pay annually to get work permits.



Drug Mule Cases Abroad

YB Wong Chen asked the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on the government's stance and policy regarding drug mule cases abroad such as Pannir Selva A/L Pranthaman.



Shelters for Women

YB Wong Chen asked the Ministry of Women, Family and Community Development on the government's plan to increase the number of shelters in rural areas and to renovate existing shelters.



Increase in Welfare Allocations

YB Wong Chen asked the Ministry of Women, Family and Community Development on the government's plans to increase welfare allocations for programs to match the rising cost of living.





DIPLOMATIC ENGAGEMENTS



As Chair of the Parliamentary Special Select Committee (PSSC) on International Relations and International Trade, YB Wong Chen oversees Malaysia's foreign policy and trade negotiations, primarily through committee hearings and courtesy engagements with foreign ambassadors. In this role, he regularly engages with diplomats, foreign counterparts, and international organisations to advance Malaysia's strategic interests.

Beyond parliamentary work, YB Wong Chen champions the use of sports to unite political leaders across party lines, an approach that has consistently fostered trust and camaraderie in an otherwise polarised environment.

Key highlights of his diplomatic work include analysing the Agreement on Reciprocal Trade between Malaysia and the United States of America, strengthening bilateral trade relations with the Republic of Kenya, and witnessing firsthand the humanitarian challenges faced by refugees during a visit to the Kutupalong camp—the largest refugee settlement in the world.

YB Wong Chen chaired a PSSC meeting with the Home Ministry on the matter of refoulement.

August 28 – Kenya Report

YB Wong Chen chaired a PSSC meeting to discuss the report from the Kenya trip and plans for the upcoming year.

August 31 to September 5 – Trip to Bangladesh

YB Wong Chen and the PSSC of International Relations and Trade travelled to Bangladesh to learn more about refugees and the Rohingya crisis. They visited Cox's Bazar, the Bangladesh government's RRRC (the Office of the Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commissioner) and met officials from UNHCR.

September 27 to October 3 – Trip to Kenya

YB Wong Chen travelled to Kenya with the PSSC of International Relations and Trade to learn more about Kenya's trade. They visited the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KNCCI) and met the Kenyan MITI (Ministry of Investment, Trade and Industry) Minister, Hon. Lee Kinyanjui.

October 7 – Budget

YB Wong Chen chaired a PSSC meeting on the 2026 budget, upcoming hearings and Trump's visit to Malaysia.



October 23 – Palestinian Caucus

YB Wong Chen chaired a PSSC meeting with the Palestinian Caucus led by YB Syed Ibrahim Syed Noh.

October 23 – Foreign Ministry

YB Wong Chen chaired a PSSC meeting with the Foreign Minister, YB Mohamad Hasan.



November 6 – Joint Committee hearing

YB Wong Chen chaired a joint committee hearing between the PSSC of International Relations and Trade and the PSSC for Human Rights, Election and Institutional Reform.

November 12 – US Trade Deal

YB Wong Chen chaired a PSSC hearing on the Agreement between the United States of America and Malaysia on Reciprocal Trade. The hearing involved the American Malaysian Chamber of Commerce, Socio Economic Research Centre Malaysia, Emir Research, Third World Network and MITI.

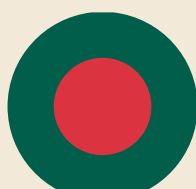

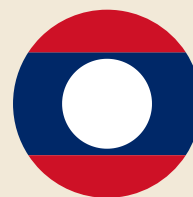

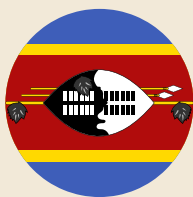

COMMUNITY & WELFARE UPDATES



Aside from his legislative and diplomatic duties in Parliament, YB Wong Chen and his office engages with the constituency of Subang through a variety of programs and forms of assistance. These include providing financial assistance to individuals in need and allocating funding to numerous associations and institutions within the constituency. Additionally, YB Wong Chen attends and supports community events, with Poh Toh celebrations and football matches with residents being particularly memorable.

A key community highlight in the second half of 2025 was Karnival Kesihatan Parlimen Subang, which provided free health screenings for residents. This was conducted in two locations: Pangsapuri Angsana in USJ 1 and Pangsapuri Enggang in Bandar Kinrara.

Another particularly active community initiative was Projek Mesra Rakyat, which allocates annual funding to various institutions to support construction, maintenance and refurbishing works.





COMMUNITY & WELFARE UPDATES

Having opened a total of 160 welfare cases from July 2025 to December 2025, YB Wong Chen's office focuses primarily on assisting the B40 communities, assisting with medical fees, bereavement, university enrolment, food, daily necessities and natural disaster cases. The office also engages in site visits and distributing festive vouchers have also helped to strengthen connections with various communities within the constituency.





COMMUNITY & WELFARE COLLAGE



PROGRAM SUMBANGAN SEMPENA HARI RAYA AIDILADHA



For 2025, YB Wong Chen's office conducted programs in conjunction with Hari Raya Aidiladha which fell on 7 June 2025.

For the whole month of May 2025, the officers were preparing for the donation program, engaging with the mosques and surau within the Subang constituency to promote this program as well as encourage their participation.

A total of RM72, 900 was allocated for 2025 Hari Raya Aidiladha celebration.

Out of the 12 mosques and 50 surau within the constituency of which the office has records, majority of the mosques and surau participated in this program.

On Hari Raya Aidiladha, the officers visited several mosques to celebrate the auspicious event together with the constituents.

The program concluded successfully, benefitting families in need and strengthening the spirit of community and solidarity.



PROGRAM SAMBUTAN PERAYAAN POH TOH



The Hungry Ghost Festival, which is also known as Poh Toh or Zhong Yuan Festival, started on 23rd August and ended on 21st September for the year 2025. It is an important event for the Chinese community.

This year, as usual, the Poh Toh associations in the constituency organized prayers, charity auctions and post-prayer dinner events.

The prayers included ancestral worship, burning of joss papers, incense and candles, along with food offerings for the spirits. These actions were meant to appease and seek protection from the spirits.



Within the Subang constituency, there are a total of 19 Poh Toh associations (as of year 2025) based in Kinrara and Subang Jaya.

The associations had started planning for the Poh Toh events since the beginning of year 2025, as organizing the event takes a lot of logistical efforts. While some of the associations organized both prayers and dinner events, several associations only had prayers without dinner events.

This year, YB Wong Chen's office attended 13 Poh Toh dinners. At each dinner events, there were charity auctions aimed to raise funds for the underprivileged. YB Wong Chen's office gave fundings to all Poh Toh associations to support their kind initiatives.

Mr Leong and the other officers also attended the dinner events hosted by other Poh Toh associations.





KARNIVAL KESIHATAN PANGSAPURI ANGSAANA USJ

Receiving positive response from the first Karnival Kesihatan held in Kampung Lembah Kinrara prompted YB Wong Chen's office to bring the health carnival to a new location, catering to more communities who could benefit from this initiative. The second Karnival Kesihatan took place at Pangsapuri Angsana where almost 300 residents participated in the free health screenings and other activities.

Improving from the first Karnival Kesihatan, YB Wong Chen's office invited several government agencies to collaborate with the office. These agencies were Jabatan Khidmat Masyarakat Cawangan Subang Jaya, eKasih under Implementation Coordination Unit from Prime Minister's Department, Pertubuhan Keselamatan Sosial (PERKESO) Cawangan Petaling Jaya, and Employees' Provident Fund (EPF).



These agencies were invited to collaborate with YB Wong Chen's office to provide the community at Pangsapuri Angsana advisory services as well as on-site registration for programs under their respective portfolios, enabling residents access to welfare and social aid, employment support, and other community-focused services in one convenient location. We also reached out to Jabatan Penerangan Daerah Petaling to help us promote the carnival to the community at Pangsapuri Angsana.



KARNIVAL KESIHATAN PANGSAPURI ANGSA NA USJ

The free health screening was the main attraction. This time, YB Wong Chen's office worked with Klinik Kesihatan Kelana Jaya who sent two dedicated teams to provide the health screenings to the community.

Beyond the agency booths and health screenings, YB Wong Chen's office also provided a free batik painting workshop for the children as well as lucky draw activities to attract more participation from the community at Pangsapuri Angsana.

The community leaders at Pangsapuri Angsana were very welcoming, committed, and gave their full cooperation in making this program a success.

The success of this program encouraged another round of Karnival Kesihatan on Kinrara side.





Our final Karnival Kesihatan of 2025 concluded at Pangsapuri Enggang, Bandar Kinrara, benefiting residents across all six blocks.

We collaborated with Klinik Kesihatan Puchong Batu 14 to provide free health screenings for residents, including dental check-ups, blood sugar tests, blood pressure checks, cholesterol tests, and BMI assessments. Measles and Rubella vaccinations were also available for children.

The National Cancer Society of Malaysia (NCSM) was also present to provide residents with free Immunochemical Faecal Occult Blood Test (IFOBT) for Colorectal Cancer (CRC) Screening.





As usual, we collaborated with various government agencies to provide residents with advisory services and on-site registration for their respective programmes.

Government agencies that participated were:

- Jabatan Khidmat Masyarakat Cawangan Subang Jaya,
- eKasih under the Implementation Coordination Unit from the Prime Minister's Department,
- Pertubuhan Keselamatan Sosial (PERKESO) Cawangan Petaling Jaya.



The Joint-Management Body of Pangsapuri Enggang also helped to arrange the logistics and venue booking. The residents were very helpful and passionate in organising the event.



The event saw a great turnout, with nearly 200 residents participating in the health screenings and vaccination programme. The residents were appreciative of the services provided. Additionally, YB Wong Chen's office gave out food baskets for 60 underprivileged families across 6 resident blocks.



Residents have conveyed that accessing Klinik Kesihatan Batu 14 is difficult due to the lack of transportation. In early 2025, YB Wong Chen proposed to the Minister of Economy that the establishment of an additional Klinik Kesihatan in the Kinrara area be incorporated into the Thirteenth Malaysia Plan (RMK-13) to cater to the area's growing population.

In October 2025, we received an update from the Ministry of Finance under Budget 2026 indicating that a Klinik Kesihatan Jenis 2 is currently under consideration for development in Bandar Kinrara. YB Wong Chen will raise this matter through a Kamar Khas during the upcoming 2026 Parliamentary sitting to follow up on its progress.

MID AUTUMN FESTIVAL PROGRAM



In conjunction with the Mooncake Festival, YB Wong Chen's office visited the Low Cost Flats in PJS7 and Victory Home in Bukit Kuchai to present Giant vouchers and mooncakes to senior citizens and children with underprivileged backgrounds.

In total, YB Wong Chen's office gave away 120 mooncakes and vouchers worth RM5,500.

DEEPAVALI VOUCHER DISTRIBUTION

For Deepavali, our office collaborated with the ADUN offices of Kinrara and Subang Jaya, as well as various temples and local associations, to provide welfare assistance in the form of grocery cash vouchers to eligible residents within our constituency.

To maximise outreach to as many underprivileged individuals and families as possible, we worked closely with the two ADUN offices, which helped us identify constituents who had not yet received their festive vouchers. Simultaneously, several temples and associations shared their own lists of Indian families and individuals residing in our constituency, further enabling us to reach those in need.



After several weeks of applicant verification and cross-checking between various name lists, our office finally commenced the Deepavali voucher distribution programme on the Deepavali weekend.

In total, over 400 constituents were approved to receive grocery cash vouchers, amounting to an approximate RM75,000 worth of vouchers.





PROGRAM STI MADANI MOSTI

In the second half of 2025, the Ministry of Science, Technology & Innovation (MOSTI) announced the launching of its new STI MADANI Program.

Aimed at addressing the notable decline in students' interest and enrolment in STEM courses in the country, this federal initiative allocated RM10,000 to every Parliament constituency office, tasking every Member of Parliament to facilitate a local program that would cultivate engagement, awareness and interests in the elements of Science, Technology & Innovation (STI) in the constituency.



With the RM10,000 allocation from the Ministry as well as a collaboration with SpaceQuest Asia, our office organized STEM workshops for two selected schools in Subang to provide students with innovative STEM programs in Robotics and Cybersecurity, fields they may not typically have the opportunity to explore or access.



The two selected schools were SK Subang Jaya and SMK USJ 8, targeting students of various age groups.

The full day program was split into two halves where students would alternate between robotics and cybersecurity workshops throughout the day. The programs ended with a robotics competition between students to see whose vehicle modifications proved more effective!





PROJEK MESRA RAKYAT PARLIMEN SUBANG

Projek Mesra Rakyat (PMR) is a programme under which an allocation of RM2 million is provided by the Prime Minister's Office to offices of the Members of Parliament to implement infrastructure projects aimed at upgrading and maintaining facilities for the benefit of local constituents.

Since 2023, YB Wong Chen's office has allocated RM30,000 to each government school in the constituency to support the upgrading and maintenance of school facilities. This year, 52 government schools received the allocation and carried out necessary maintenance works to create a more conducive learning environment.

Examples of PMR-funded upgrades include repainting school buildings, replacing covered corridors and windows, and improving drainage systems. More "before and after" updates of these projects are posted on YB Wong Chen's Facebook page.

Besides government schools, YB Wong Chen is also keen on ensuring both the police IPD's and Balai Bomba's have a well-maintained environment to better serve the constituents. .

Through PMR, YB Wong Chen has allocated RM 50,000 to each of the District Police Headquarters, and Fire And Rescue Stations of both Subang Jaya and Kinrara, totalling RM200,000 to carry out the necessary maintenance works and upgrades.

Each year, YB Wong Chen is also committed to allocating funds to several low-cost flats to repair and upgrade their facilities. This is to ensure that the residents have better living conditions.

This year, 6 low-cost flats from both Kinrara and Subang Jaya were chosen for the PMR 2025 project.

Kinrara area:

- Pangsapuri Enggang
- Pangsapuri Kinrara Taman Kinrara 4
- Pangsapuri Melur Taman Bukit Kinrara

Subang Jaya Area:

- Pangsapuri Angsana USJ 1
- Pangsapuri SS13

The proposed upgrades for each low-cost flats vary. Community leaders consult fellow residents to analyse urgent infrastructure upgrades. Subsequently, these upgrades are communicated to our office.

Some examples of the upgrades included resurfacing the parking lot, rebuilding the badminton court, repairing the leaking rooftop, and also expanding the drainage system.

While parts of the projects were completed, several remaining projects are estimated to be completed in early 2026 due to extreme weather conditions. Our office will share the before and after pictures after all the projects are completed on YB Wong Chen's Facebook page.



KLINIK KESIHATAN USJ 1



Since the *Majlis Penyerahan Surat Setuju Terima (SST)* in April 2025, significant progress has been made in regards to the construction of Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1.

YB Wong Chen's office visited the site twice since then, and is happy to report that groundwork for the clinic has begun.

Occasional updates on the progress of the long-awaited Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1 will be provided from time to time on YB Wong Chen's official Facebook page and future newsletters.

A land that was once filled with vegetation for years is now a site expected to benefit the people of Subang Jaya by 2028.



A RECAP ON KLINIK KESIHATAN USJ 1

Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1 is a Type 2 clinic (Jenis 2). A Type 2 Health Clinic can accommodate an average of 500-800 patients per day.

Among the services that will be offered at the Klinik are:

- OPD: Outpatient Department
- A&E: Accident and Emergency
- MCH: Maternal and Child Health
- Dental
- Rehab: Rehabilitation
- X-Ray
- Lab: Laboratory
- Pharmacy
