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Foreword by

My dear constituents of Subang,

As we reach the halfway mark of 2025, I want to take this opportunity to share with you a reflection of the past six months, both from the lens of national issues and our community work on the ground in Parliament Subang.

The first half of 2025 saw the global economy wrecked by uncertainties. One of the most negative developments has been the imposition of tariffs by the Trump administration. These unilateral protectionist measures will have far-reaching effects on global trade, including Malaysia's export-driven economy. In the Malaysian context, we may begin to see the slowing down of certain industries and a shift towards diversification of markets especially within ASEAN and the Asia-Pacific.

Domestically, the first half of 2025 has been defined by significant legislative and political activities. The Parliamentary Services Act—recently granted Royal Assent—marks a vital step forward for parliamentary independence and institutional reforms. It is an achievement long overdue and one that strengthens the doctrine of separation of powers.

Malaysia's Chairmanship of ASEAN this year has progressed with mixed results. While we've made strides in convening dialogue on regional security and economic frameworks, we must remain vigilant in upholding democratic values and human rights as regional norms.

Political developments have also included party elections, and the recent judicial crisis continues to be a matter of concerns. As your Member of Parliament, I will continue to uphold the integrity of our democratic institutions and push for real and consistent reform.

Transparency and accountability remain central issues in my work. While anti-corruption enforcement has shown signs of more activities, the overall report card for institutional reforms remains checkered.

In my role as Chairman of the Parliamentary Special Select Committee on International Relations and International Trade, my team and I have worked on scrutinising FTAs and executive actions, ensuring policies remain people-focused and rooted in fairness. We have conducted several meetings in the first half of the year, discussing a range of issues related to international relations and international trade.

Though admittedly, most of the meetings held by my Committee thus far for this year have revolved around the U.S. tariffs. We have been in talks with the lead negotiator from the Ministry of Trade and Investments, and I also expect further engagement with MITI as this tariff issue progresses with time. Other than that, we also held a hearing with potentially impacted industries in Malaysia, mainly the furniture industry.

The gravity of this situation is very clear as Parliament opened for one day in May 2025 to allow Members of Parliament to debate on this pressing issue. I, too, took the chance to debate on this issue in my capacity as a Member of Parliament and Chairman of the Parliamentary Special Select Committee for International Trade and International Relations.

I've also had my term renewed as Non-Executive Chairman of MDV, where we continue to focus on driving digital and tech-based SME financing for Malaysia's future economy.

On the community front, several key community programmes were successfully organised in the first half of 2025, including:

On education, we've committed to the PMR School Project, benefiting 52 schools in our constituency this year at RM30,000 each—focused on maintenance, repair, and upgrades. Legislative Duties in Parliament



King's Speech Summary

In the month of February, the King gave his speech in the state opening of Parliament where he set out the government's agenda for the coming year. In a speech responding to the King, Wong Chen focused on the state of the Malaysian economy and stressed the importance of hosting data centers.

He emphasised that 3 gigawatts of renewable energy is projected to be necessary within the next 3 years and suggested a reduction to RM0.32/kWh to ensure a level playing field. Wong Chen also proposed that the government set up a Royal Commission to investigate the state of the Malaysian energy sector.



Wong Chen encouraged the Malaysian government to overhaul its education system and how improving the quality of our education could create higher-paying domestic jobs and reduce migration to Singapore.

Furthermore, Wong Chen discussed the potential impacts of high tariff threats on BRICS members. He urged the government to reconsider its BRICS participation, reduce its trade surplus with the United States, and finalise the EU-Malaysia free trade agreement.



Parliamentary Questions & Speeches

February 5 – Rising Living Costs

Wong Chen questioned the Ministry of Economy on the Malaysian Department of Statistics' recommendations to combat rising living costs. He also asked how the government plans to use PADU data to address this issue.

February 19 – Wheeling Charges for Renewable Energy

Wong Chen interjected the PETRA Minister's reply to the King's speech to question the high wheeling charges for renewable energy.

March 4 – Support for Constitutional Amendment

During YB Pasir Gudang's debate on a Constitutional amendment, Wong Chen interjected to highlight NGO and think tank support for the Bill while urging MPs to follow suit.

May 5 – Responding to Trump's Tariffs

Wong Chen delivered a speech during the Special Sitting of the Dewan Rakyat 2025 addressing Trump's tariffs and Malaysia's strategy to prepare and respond.



Kamar Khas (Special Chambers)

February 6 – Gun Act Reform

Wong Chen urged the Ministry of Home Affairs to amend the Gun Act 1960 to allow under-18 national sports talents to train with firearms under strict provisions.

February 6 – Urgent Need for Subang Health Clinics

Wong Chen addressed the Ministry of Health on the critical lack of health clinics in the Subang constituency, advocating for immediate action.



Parliamentary Select Committee (PSSC)

On February 5th, YB Wong Chen chaired the PSSC International Relations and Trade Agenda 2025 meeting.





Diplomatic Duties & International Work

JANUARY

To kick start January, Wong Chen met H.E. Ary, the Brazilian Ambassador and had a Parliament meeting with the political financing group together with YB William Leong. Just two days after, he met Ms. Chantal, the new ambassador designate of Switzerland.

In the third week of January, Wong Chen had a meeting with former MITI Minister Mustapha Mohamed. He also had a meeting with Seow Wei Liang, the Second Secretary (Political) of the Singapore High Commission. On the same day, he met H.E. Muhammetniyaz Mashalov, the Turkmenistan Ambassador to have a bilateral discussion.



FEBRUARY

In February, Wong Chen joined the football match against Central Asian embassies and met with H.E. Valiollah Mohammadi Nasrabadi, the Iranian ambassador. On 13 February, he had a meeting with H.E. Bruno Eduardo Rodriguez Parrilla, Cuban Foreign Minister. YB Wong Chen also welcomed the ASEAN ambassadors to Parliament. The next day, he met with H.E. Herman Pule Diamonds, High Commissioner of Namibia to Malaysia.

Wong Chen met with H.E. Benoit Guidee, France Director for Asia and Oceania and H.E. Axel Cruau. He also had a meeting with Sir Lindsay Hoyle, UK Speaker of the House of Commons on the same day. He then had a quick chat with H.E. Edagrd Kagan, the US Ambassador. On the 20th Feb, Wong Chen attended a lunch meeting organised by H.E. Andreas Lautner, Ambassador of Austria which was also attended by Singaporean High Commission, Ambassadors of Germany, Spain, and EU.





MARCH

On 4th March, Wong Chen started the month with a dinner hosted by H.E. Danielle Heinecke, the Australian High Commissioner in honour of H.E. Michelle Chan, the Deputy Secretary. He attended a meeting in the Palace of Westminster, the UK Parliament where he met the Speaker, Sir Lindsay Hoyle. On the same day, he also hosted a group of 70 Thai students from the Law-Politics Program of the Hatyai Wittayalai School in Parliament. After that, he went for a meeting in Chatham House with Ben Bland, the Asia-Pacific Director where they had a talk on international matters, sharing various perspectives. On 17 March, Wong Chen had a meeting with H.E. Karima el Korri, the UN Ambassador to Malaysia.



APRIL

On 7th April, Wong Chen attended a meeting with the Ukraine delegation. He also had a follow up meeting with the leaders of the NUG of Myanmar, Dr. Win Myat Aye and Dr. Mya Thida. He ended his second week of April by having a meeting with Siree Allers from the Internal Unit Chief of the US Embassy in Kuala Lumpur. He also had a zoom call with EU officials and His Excellency Sjiro Seam, an ASEAN-EU Ambassador. On 16th April, YB Wong Chen met the new Ambassador from Finland, H.E. Anne Vasara.

On 18th April, Wong Chen met the Indian High Commissioner, Hon. Pabrita Margherita. He also attended a meeting with Hon. Edwige Diaz, a French Member of Parliament and H. E. Axel Cruau, an ambassador of France and had a meeting with H.E. Batyr Amanov, Turkmenistan Vice President on the same day. The next day, YB Wong Chen had a meeting with the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) with the delegation of MPs from Iceland, Lichtenstein, Norway, and Switzerland.

On 28th April, he visited the Embassy of Ukraine to offer condolences to the civilians of recent bombings. After that, he had a lunch meeting with Christophe Kiener, the Head of Unit for South, Southeast Asia and Australasia of the Directorate-General for Trade of the European Commission. On the same day, he had tea with Hon. Behnam Saeedi, Iranian MP counterpart and had a dinner with H.E. Mavsuma Muini, the Deputy Speaker of Tajikistan.



MAY

YB Wong Chen had a meeting with Bob Harris, the Assistant Legal Advisor East Asia and Pacific Affairs of the US Department of State. He also had a meeting with Her Royal Highness Puteri Intan Safinaz from Malaysian Red Crescent Society. After that, he attended a meeting with Tom Shepherd, UK acting Deputy High Commissioner to Malaysia.

On 17 May, he met with H.E. Muhammetniyaz Mashalov, the Turkmenistan Ambassador to improve bilateral ties between Malaysia and Turkmenistan. He also had a meeting with H.E. Kirstine Berner, Danish Ambassador. On 28 May, he had a quick lunch with H.E. Jose Luis Pardo, the Spanish Ambassador.

Wong Chen was also at the Africa Day celebrations where he caught up and congratulated several African ambassadors including Namibia, Kenya, Nigeria and Libya. The next day, YB Wong Chen was in Parliament to meet some youths from Ukraine, representing the Liberal Democratic League of Ukraine.



JUNE

On 2nd June, YB Wong Chen met up with James Heappey, the former Minister of State for the Armed Forces of the United Kingdom. He then met the visiting Indian delegation of MPs led by Hon. Sanjay Kumar Jha, 8 MPs from the Lok Sabha and H.E. Reddy.

On June 4th, YB Wong Chen met with H.E. Luis Fonseca Sanchez, the Director General for North America, Eastern Europe, Asia and the Pacific of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Spain. The next day, he had a meeting with several European Ambassadors and diplomats.

Community & Welfare Updates

Karnival Kesihatan Kinrara

On 31st May 2025, our office organised a Karnival Kesihatan in partnership with Malaysian Debt Venture (MDV) and Klinik Kesihatan Puchong Batu 14. In his dual role as Subang MP and MDV Chairman, YB Wong Chen selected Kampung Lembah Kinrara within our constituency for MDV's CSR initiative, providing essential equipment including tables, chairs, and indoor sports equipment to enhance the local KRT's community activities and daily operations.

In collaboration with Klinik Kesihatan Puchong Batu 14, our office organized comprehensive free health screenings for residents, including glucose, eye, and blood pressure tests. The clinic also provided complimentary influenza vaccinations specifically for senior citizens with chronic conditions. While adults participated in health screenings, mini sports activities were organized to encourage active lifestyles for the younger generation.



Program Sumbangan Sempena Hari Raya Korban

As part of our Program Sumbangan Haiwan Korban sempena Hari Raya Aidiladha Peringkat Pusat Khidmat Rakyat Parlimen Subang this year, our office contributed livestock for korban to surau, masjid, the District Police Headquarters (IPD), and Bomba stations in Puchong and Subang Jaya. In total, 12 masjid (5 in Kinrara and 7 in Subang Jaya) and 29 surau (17 in Kinrara and 12 in Subang Jaya) received contributions.

Project Mesra Rakyat 2025

Our office received an annual grant of RM2 million from the Prime Minister's Office to help uplift government infrastructure. Every year, we disperse an equal grant to all the schools under Parliament Subang, a sum of **RM30,000 per school across 52 schools.**

The remaining amount is dispersed to low-cost flats, police, and bomba headquarters. Below are the list of schools, low-cost flats, and others:

Klinik Kesihatan

After over a **decade**, work on the long awaited Klinik Kesihatan in USJ 1 has finally begun. On **24th April 2025**, the official handover ceremony for the **Surat Setuju Terima** (Letter of Acceptance) and the appointment of the Supervising Officer for the Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1 construction project took place at the Public Works Department (JKR – Jabatan Kerja Raya) Headquarters in Kuala Lumpur.

The ceremony was officiated by Deputy Minister of Works, YB Datuk Seri Ahmad Maslan. The event began with remarks from the Deputy Minister, followed by the formal appointment of Ir. Haji Shukri Bin Ishak, Director of JKR Selangor, as the Supervising Officer for the project. The Letter of Acceptance (SST) was then presented to the successful contractor, **Atlantas Construction Sdn Bhd**.

In his speech, the Deputy Minister expressed hope that this high-impact project would greatly benefit the local community. He also stressed the importance of the contractor adhering to the project's specifications, timeline, and maintaining high construction quality.

With strong collaboration and commitment from all stakeholders, the project is expected to be a major success and bring substantial value to the public and relevant agencies.

The project is expected to take **36 months** to complete, with a target date in the **first quarter of 2028** to be fully operational.



THE LONG FIGHT

The journey to establish Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1 in Subang began as early as **2008**, when the application for the project was first marked as pending. For years, the office persistently followed up, sending nearly **20 letters** to the authorities. A breakthrough came in 2016, when the Ministry of Education approved the transfer of land to the Ministry of Health (MoH) for the proposed clinic.

In 2018, during the Budget Speech in Parliament, YB Wong Chen raised a question to the Minister of Health on the project's timeline. A vague response was given, with no concrete commitments apart from a site visit by state health officers.

By March 2019, the Deputy Minister of Health shockingly revealed that no official application for the clinic existed in the system. This prompted YB Wong Chen and Subang Jaya ADUN YB Michelle Ng to request an urgent meeting with Jabatan Kesihatan Negeri (JKN) Selangor. The meeting in **April 2019** revealed that the clinic would cost **RM35 million** and was only projected to be operational by 2024 or later, with budgeting to begin in 2021. Later that month, a written reply from JKN confirmed the clinic's planned facilities and that the application would be considered in 2020 under the 12th Malaysia Plan (RMK-12) Rolling Plan 1.

In August 2021, the **Economic Planning Unit (EPU)** under the Prime Minister's Department shockingly cancelled the project, citing increased estimated costs of **RM67.8 million** (up from the original RM45 million). In March 2022, YB Wong Chen issued a press statement condemning the cancellation and highlighting the urgent need for public healthcare facilities in Subang, a constituency of nearly **478,000 people** with no public hospital or Klinik Kesihatan.

In October 2022, then Health Minister YB Khairy Jamaluddin informed YB Wong Chen that the USJ 1 clinic had been included in the 2023 Budget. The reinstatement was acknowledged publicly, and Wong Chen thanked both the Health Minister and ADUN for their relentless advocacy.

On 9 March 2023, the Deputy Minister of Health officially announced in Parliament that the Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1 project had been approved and would begin in 2023.

By 7 February 2025, detailed procurement steps had been obtained during a Special Chambers (Kamar Khas) session in Parliament with the **Deputy Health Minister, YB Dato Lukanisman bin Awang Sauni**. The tender was advertised in October 2024, and closed in November 2024, followed by document evaluations, and final decisions in February–March 2025.



Finally, on 30th April 2025, **Jabatan Kerja Raya** announced that the tender had been awarded to **Atlantas Construction Sdn Bhd**, marking the start of construction by May 2025. The Klinik Kesihatan Jenis 2 is expected to be completed in 36 months, providing healthcare for up to **800 patients a day**.

The announcement marked the climax of a **12-year campaign** involving **17 parliamentary questions**, two special chambers hearings, and coordination across six Health Ministers. YB Wong Chen, in a Facebook post, expressed gratitude to Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim and relevant ministries for fulfilling this long-standing promise to the people of Subang.

ABOUT THE CLINIC

Klinik Kesihatan USJ 1 is a Type 2 clinic (Jenis 2). Generally, Health Clinics are classified into 7 types, from Type 1 to Type 7, based on the average daily patient attendance. A Type 2 Health Clinic can accommodate an average of 500-800 patient visits per day.

Among the services that will be offered at the Klinik are:

- OPD: Outpatient Department
- A&E: Accident and Emergency
- MCH: Maternal and Child Health
- Dental
- Rehab: Rehabilitation
- X-Ray
- Lab: Laboratory
- Pharmacy

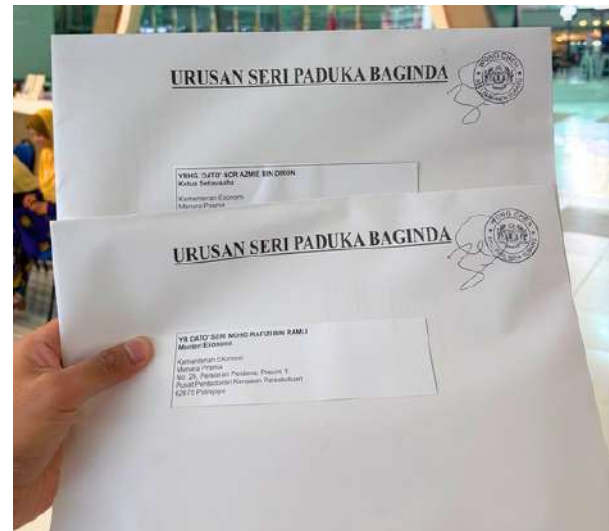


POTENTIAL KLINIK KESIHATAN KINRARA

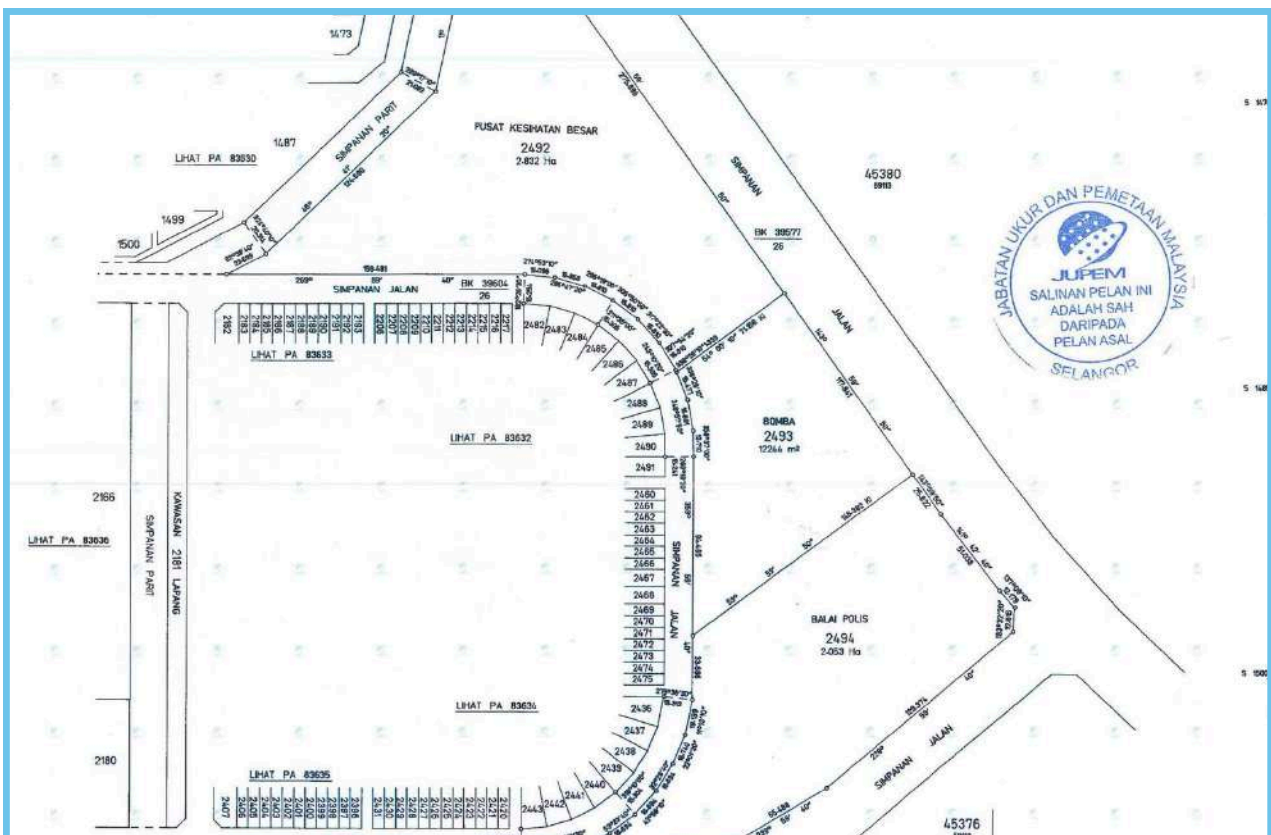
The Ministry of Health has identified the need for a new Klinik Kesihatan in Kinrara, given its large population of 336,489 residents and the current overcrowding at nearby facilities which are struggling with space limitations and patient loads exceeding 1,000 daily.

A 7-acre site near IPD Serdang, has been earmarked for the new clinic. The proposal will be considered for inclusion in the upcoming Rolling Plan under the 13th Malaysia Plan (RMK-13), pending government approval.

On February 14th 2025, the P104 office started the ball rolling by writing to both the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Economy. The ministry is also prepared to conduct site visits and briefings to support the process. We will keep residents updated on any updates regarding this.

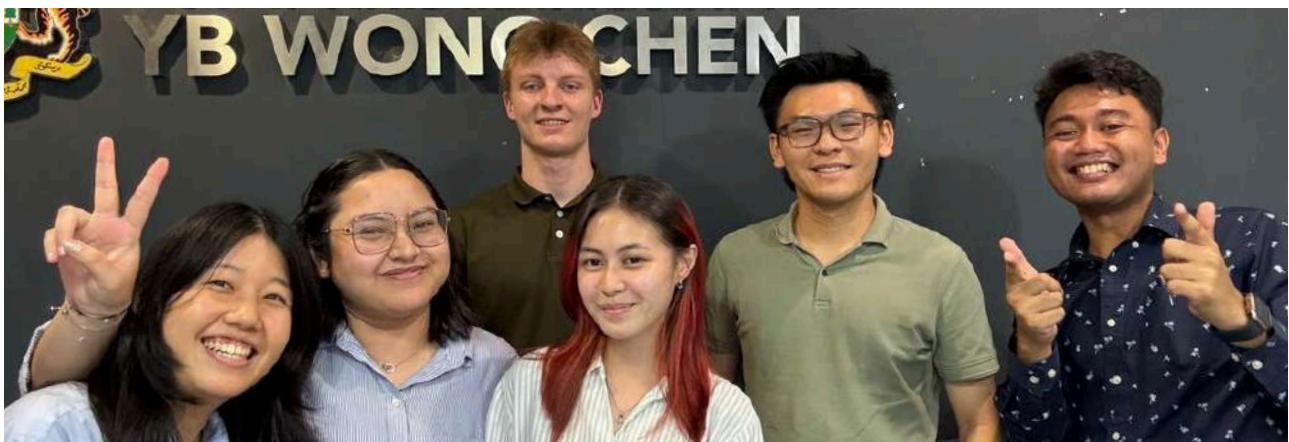

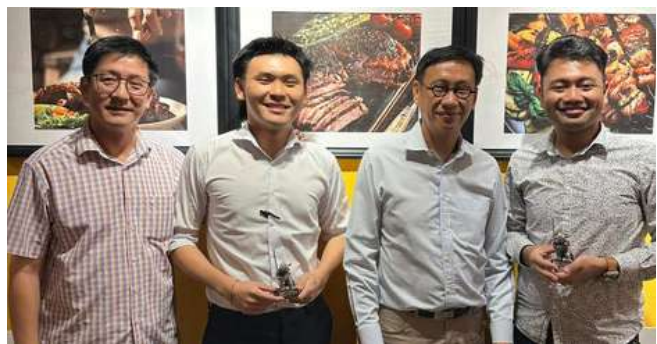
