FOREWORD

Wong Chen



My dear Subang constituents,

I am pleased to present our newsletter for the first six months of 2026.

Allow me to share my political reflections and directions at this midpoint of 2026. In recent months, I have had to endure severe political challenges. You may have read about my abrupt five days termination notice as MDV Chairman and also the ongoing access restrictions to the MyKhas Portal.

On the MDV matter, I have ironically received a letter dated 3rd June 2026 from the Ministry of Finance expressing their deepest appreciation and gratitude for my excellent service but gave no reasons whatsoever for my termination. The bigger irony is that the letter is classified as “sulit” (secret) and as such I am unable to share the full content of the letter for all to view.

The remaining core issue is the blocking of my office access to the MyKhas Portal. The matter remains unresolved with no written explanation given to date by the Prime Minister’s Office. While the government has publicly said that access will be given to another third party by which presumably, my office can forward our pending and existing documents to, yet no concrete action, other than words, has been taken by the Madani government. They have not informed my office nor the people of Subang where they can apply for community funds under the MyKhas Portal. The MP for Petaling Jaya, YB Lee Chean Chung, continues to face similar problems too.

FOREWORD

I have been going on the ground to hold Teh Tarik sessions with my constituents in Subang Jaya and Kinrara. I have conducted eight Teh Tarik events to date. In these events, I sought to inform my constituents of Parliamentary developments and also to gather community feedback.

In truth, I am seriously considering my next political direction. I took the following oath when I became your Member of Parliament; "I, Wong Chen, having been elected as a Member of the House of Representatives, do solemnly swear that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a Member to the best of my ability, that I will bear true faith and allegiance to Malaysia, and that I will preserve, protect and defend the Constitution."

The above oath has three components, (a) to discharge my duties, (b) allegiance to Malaysia and (c) to defend the Constitution. These three components will be heaviest on my mind in the coming days and weeks.

This newsletter will contain a record of the many activities and projects that we have done over the last six months. As such, I want to record my deep appreciation to my officers, volunteers, interns and community leaders for their dedication, professionalism and tireless service to the people of Subang. Their commitment enables my office to continue delivering meaningful work for the betterment of the community.

As with every edition of this newsletter, we continue our practice of full transparency by disclosing details of our parliamentary office budget for public review. I remain fully committed to transparency and accountability.

What happens in the coming days and weeks, rest assured that I will never abandon those core principles.

Also do take to heart that my fight against corruption and abuses of power will continue. In whatever new shape or form, whether as an MP or otherwise, my oath of allegiance to Malaysia and my duty to defend our Constitution and democracy will endure.

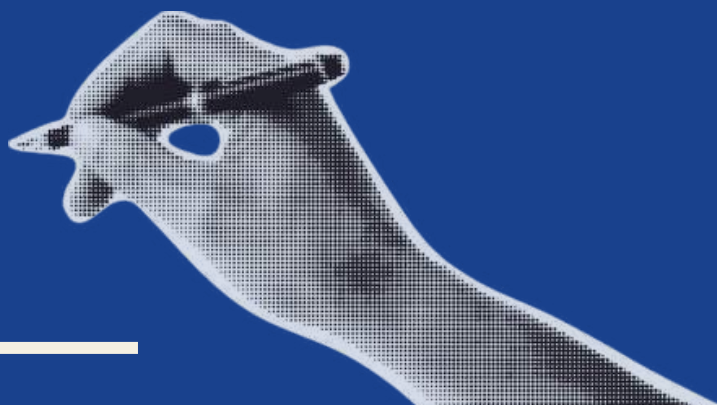

LEGISLATIVE DUTIES



Parliament Speeches

The primary role of a Member of Parliament is to debate and approve legislation, and hold the government accountable by scrutinising its policies and actions. YB Wong Chen carries out this responsibility through parliamentary speeches, debates, and questions, contributing to discussions on proposed legislation and ensuring greater transparency and accountability in government.



During the first sitting of Parliament, YB Wong Chen delivered two speeches. On 12 January, he spoke on the need to address modern corruption in Malaysian politics, arguing that existing anti-corruption efforts have fallen short. He also proposed reforms such as public asset declarations and independent government audits to strengthen transparency and accountability.



LEGISLATIVE DUTIES

In his speech on 12 February, YB Wong Chen addressed international trade issues and the need to improve cross-border dispute mediation. As tariffs continue to affect the Malaysian economy, he raised concerns about ongoing developments and their impacts.



YB also proposed the Political Funding Act to promote transparency in the funding of political parties, individuals and their respective campaigns. Furthermore, he supported separating the roles of the Attorney General and Public Prosecutor to prevent undue influence over the justice system.

UNHCR



In February, YB Wong Chen's PSSC Committee on International Relations and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees co-organised a symposium on refugees' access to legal work and education. The event explored ways to promote stability, responsible management, and economic contributions while addressing challenges faced by displaced communities.



Legislative Duties



YB Wong Chen takes it upon himself to scrutinise bills proposed by the Government, often garnering support from like-minded MPs who refuse to simply become a mere rubber stamp. Through tireless advocacy, meetings and debates, he works to ensure that bills passed in Parliament are transparent, legally sound and of proper substance in line with principles of good governance.

February 24 YB first expressed his support for separating the roles of the Attorney General and the Public Prosecutor in a joint press statement. However, he raised concerns about the process of selecting the public prosecutor, which creates concentrated power that may not reflect the voices of Malaysians.

March 2 YB led efforts on the Public Prosecutor Bill, calling for a Parliament Select Committee to be created to choose the new public prosecutor and maintain a balance of power. The press statement also warns of this bill opening paths to a misuse of power.

June 23 In the summer session, YB continued his fight for transparency in the public prosecutor separation process. He led a group of six MPs to issue another statement encouraging the bill to include a confirmation by bipartisan members of Parliament.

June 29 In response to the government seeking to revive TURAP, a digital platform connecting migrant workers with employers, YB issued a joint press statement raising concerns about the transparency of the platform's mechanics, as it seems to continue to encourage migrant exploitations, while maximizing a private monopoly of the migrant labor force.



Legislative Duties



YB Wong Chen has consistently and persistently advocated for the passing of a Political Financing Act since the beginning of his political career. To that end he chairs the All-Party Parliamentary Group Malaysia (APPGM) on political financing. This proposed act would see a cap on political donations, and government funding for political parties based on election results.

Further, he has repeatedly called for public asset declaration by both senior public servants and Members of Parliament, as well as the reintroduction of the Parliamentary Services Act (PSA) to ensure that Parliament is able to act as an independent body, and not subservient to the Prime Minister's Office.

Diplomacy



The establishment of Parliamentary Special Select Committees (PSSCs) marks a significant development in Malaysia's parliamentary system, following the recent passage of reforms to strengthen their role. These committees provide a platform for MPs to conduct detailed scrutiny of government policies, examine proposed legislation, and engage with experts, stakeholders, and relevant organisations. Their purpose is to enhance transparency, accountability, and evidence-based policymaking beyond the limited time available during parliamentary sittings.



International Work



Countries with 8 regions covered across Southeast Asia, East Asia, South Asia, Central Asia, Middle East, Europe, Americas, and Oceania.

Formal Parliamentary Special Select Committee (PSSC) hearings and committee meetings held to examine Malaysia's international relations, trade policies, and diplomatic engagements with foreign governments and organisations.



Diplomacy International Work



Beyond state-to-state diplomacy, YB Wong Chen also engaged with international organisations and civil society throughout the first half of 2026. These included coordination meetings and a symposium with UNHCR on refugee and humanitarian issues, a meeting with MSF's Humanitarian Affairs Representative for Asia, and participation in the Defence Services Asia exhibition at MITEC. He also took part in an academic panel at Taylor's University on peacebuilding in Myanmar, and lent his support to a Palestine fundraising football match between Malaysian MPs and national football legends — reflecting his commitment to humanitarian causes beyond the parliamentary arena.

As Chairman of the Parliamentary Special Select Committee (PSSC) on International Relations and International Trade, YB Wong Chen's role involves engaging with foreign governments, companies, and international organizations to strengthen Malaysia's diplomatic, trade, and policy interests. These engagements, including meetings with ambassadors and participating in international forums, provide valuable insights that support better domestic policymaking. 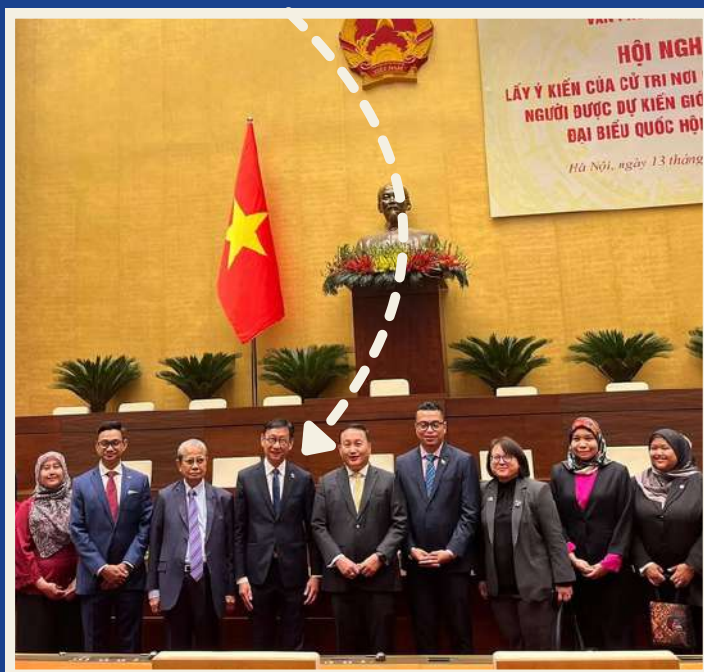


Diplomacy International Work



JANUARY

January 12 to 16 YB Wong Chen led the PSSC on an official visit to Vietnam, visiting Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City. The delegation made history as the first PSSC ever received at the Vietnamese National Assembly, where they met with the Foreign Affairs and Finance Committees, led by Hon. Don Tuan Phong. In Ho Chi Minh City, the committee met the Department of Industry and Trade covering sectors such as semiconductors and halal certification.



January 22 YB Wong Chen met Hon. Florian Hahn, Germany's Minister of State at the Federal Foreign Office, in Parliament. Accompanied by the German Ambassador to Malaysia, the meeting covered geopolitics, international trade and closer cooperation between middle power nations, reflecting the strong diplomatic ties between Malaysia and Germany.

January 28 YB Wong Chen received the newly appointed Bangladeshi High Commissioner, H.E. Manjurul Karim Khan Chowdhury, and his deputy to lay the groundwork for closer engagement between Malaysia and Bangladesh.

FEBRUARY

February 9 Wong Chen met with the Georgian Ambassador for a discussion on bilateral relations and regional geopolitics. The Ambassador provided an overview of Georgia's foreign policy priorities, and both sides exploring opportunities in trade, tourism and education.



February 23 YB chaired a Parliamentary Select Committee meeting with members of the American embassy. The session focused on the Agreement on Reciprocal Trade (ART) between Malaysia and the United States, alongside broader discussions on bilateral ties and institutional reforms.

February 24 YB attended a commemorative event marking the fourth anniversary of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, jointly organised by Ukraine, Austria and the European Union. YB Wong Chen reaffirmed Malaysia's commitment to international law, peace and multilateral diplomacy.



Diplomacy International Work



MARCH

March 10 YB Wong Chen received the Brazilian Ambassador to Malaysia, H.E. Daniella Ortega Menezes, at his Parliament office. The meeting covered geo-politics and South-South cooperation, reflecting the growing importance of strengthening ties between emerging and middle power nations across the Global South.

March 12 YB delivered the keynote address at the CCI France Malaysia's Séminaire de Réflexion 2026, engaging an audience of French business and corporate leaders based in Kuala Lumpur. The session was followed by a Q&A discussion on trade and investment matters.

March 31 YB represented the PSSC on International Relations and International Trade at the New Japan-Malaysia Industrial Cooperation Seminar to explore deeper industrial and economic collaboration between Malaysia and Japan.





Diplomacy International Work



APRIL



April 6 YB participated as a panelist at a foreign policy forum hosted by the Singapore High Commission. The event provided a platform to exchange perspectives on regional foreign policy and Malaysia-Singapore bilateral relations.

April 8 YB participated via Zoom in a global conference on the transition away from fossil fuels, organised by Parliamentarians for a Fossil Free Future. He spoke on key issues including fiscal policy, biomass, solar energy and grid infrastructure.



April 17 YB visited the Ukrainian Embassy to sign the condolences book for civilian victims of the ongoing Russian bombardment, Malaysia's solidarity with the Ukrainian people.

MAY



May 7 YB chaired a PSSC meeting with the six ambassadors of the Gulf Cooperation Council states — Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the UAE. The meeting focused largely on the ongoing Iran conflict, where Malaysia reaffirmed deep concern and its call for peaceful negotiations.



May 11 YB attended the Europe Day celebrations hosted by the EU Ambassador. The formal gathering brought together diplomats and dignitaries to mark the annual commemoration of European unity.

May 18 YB chaired a PSSC hearing with the Iranian Ambassador to Malaysia, as part of the committee's commitment to hearing all parties involved in the Middle East conflict. Malaysia reiterated its deep concern over the humanitarian and economic consequences of the conflict, and its continued call for a peaceful resolution.

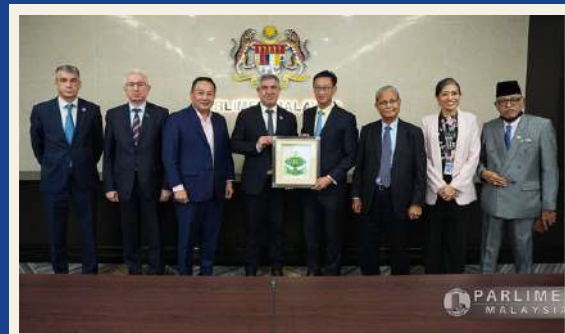


JUNE

June 3 YB Wong Chen met Mr. Hiddo Houben, Senior Advisor for Asia at the EU Directorate General of Trade and Economic Security, at the invitation of EU Ambassador H.E. Rafael Daerr. In their second meeting, the two discussed key FTA issues including labour standards, energy, market access and geo-politics.

June 16 YB Wong Chen received the newly appointed Sri Lankan High Commissioner H.E. Dharshana Perera at Parliament for a courtesy visit. The two held a warm and wide-ranging discussion on bilateral matters.

June 23 YB Wong Chen co-chaired a meeting with Hon. Vugar Bayramov, Head of the Working Group for Azerbaijani-Malaysian Interparliamentary Relations, bringing together PSSC members and the Azerbaijani delegation, which also included Ambassador H.E. Irfan Davudov. Discussions focused on bilateral relations and regional developments of mutual interest, strengthening the growing ties between both legislatures.





Community &



Welfare Updates

Over the past six months, YB Wong Chen and the team have remained committed to serving the P104 Subang community both in and out of the office. YB attended numerous community events, visited houses of worship and schools, met with local non-profit organizations, and, most importantly, engaged with constituents to better understand their concerns.

The office continued providing financial assistance to individuals facing hardships, including unemployment, serious medical conditions, natural disasters, and financial difficulties. Home visits were conducted to assess constituents' needs and ensure appropriate support, while financial aid was also extended to organizations serving communities across P104.

Other key initiatives included a community cleanup with local hikers at Bukit Wawasan, a free health screening in Zone 1, and the distribution of pantry items and grocery vouchers in SS15. YB and the office also participated in regular discussions, dialogues, and town halls with community groups across the constituency to gather feedback and stay connected with residents' needs.



Ramadan, Aidilfitri & Aidiladha



YB Wong Chen and the office attended many events celebrating Ramadan, Hari Raya Aidilfitri, and Aidiladha in the Subang constituency.

Throughout Hari Raya Aidilfitri, we visited many mosques and surau in the constituency to celebrate these occasions with the constituents.

Beyond the community celebrations, YB Wong Chen's office provided funds for all 12 mosques and a total of 37 surau within the Subang constituency in the spirit of Ramadan, as well as to



help in carrying out their yearly programs. We also worked with the mosques and surau to identify and distribute grocery vouchers to underprivileged families in Subang to support them in preparation for the holidays.





Chinese New Year



In February, YB Wong Chen and the office visited different organizations and communities within P104 to welcome the Year of the Horse. These events included several visits to old folks' homes with the Lions Club of Subang Jaya, which included lions dances to entertain the residents. YB also distributed cash vouchers to residents in need in the Chinese communities. At a CNY luncheon at the Ti-Ratana Lumbini Garden, YB also had the opportunity to participate in a simple prayer led by the Chief Reverend of Malaysia.





Wesak Day



Some highlights from our visits included a community-organized festival, where YB visited different vendors and watched students perform songs. YB also partook in prayer ceremonies honoring the Buddha.



At the very end of May, over the Wesak weekend, YB and the office visited several temples in P104 in celebration of the Buddhist holiday Wesak meeting constituents.





Town Halls



Over the past year, YB Wong Chen engaged with Subang residents through town halls organised by various community groups. These sessions provided a platform for constituents to ask questions, raise concerns, and stay informed on federal policies and YB's parliamentary work.

The town halls also featured local voices, including Kathryn, a Kinrara community leader advocating for the preservation of the forest reserve near Ayer Hitam, who spoke at the May town hall in USJ 13.

Through these engagements, YB continues to listen to residents and bring community concerns into his work at both the constituency and parliamentary levels.

Projek Mesra Rakyat

Projek Mesra Rakyat (PMR) is an initiative funded by the Prime Minister's Office that provides Members of Parliament with an annual allocation of RM2 million to undertake infrastructure improvement projects that benefit local communities.

Since 2023, YB Wong Chen's office has allocated RM30,000 annually to each government school in the Subang constituency, allowing schools to appoint their own contractors based on their needs. The funding supports essential upgrading and maintenance works such as repainting buildings, replacing covered walkways and windows, and improving drainage systems.

Besides government schools, YB Wong Chen also budgeted allocations for other institutions, including six federal agencies, two low-cost housing flats, two religious institutions, two Community-Based Rehabilitation Centres (PDK), and 1 Community Kindergarten (Tabika KEMAS).

On 20 May, YB Wong Chen's access to the MyKhas Portal was blocked, preventing the submission of PMR applications, which are mandatory under existing procedures. At a press conference, YB Wong Chen sought clarification after being informed the suspension was a direct order from Putrajaya. Although ICU JPM announced on 4 June that it would take over pending applications, the new submission process has yet to be announced.

As of 30 June, 40 schools have secured their RM30,000 PMR allocations because their applications were submitted before the portal became inaccessible. However, applications for other institutions remain pending, despite most having completed the required documentation. YB Wong Chen will continue to follow up on this matter to ensure the affected schools, agencies, and community institutions can proceed with their maintenance works as soon as possible.

Updates on maintenance projects for schools that have secured PMR allocations will continue to be shared on YB Wong Chen's Facebook page. So far, SK Pusat Bandar Puchong 1, Pusat Bandar Puchong 2, and Puchong Indah have successfully completed their upgrading projects.

Due to his lifelong passion for sports, YB Wong Chen finds ways to incorporate sports in his work, both with the P104 community, and among parliament. This includes two football teams, one for the residents of Subang, and one for members of parliament, and a basketball team for members of parliament.

The office also plays pickleball once a week after the workday is over. These games create opportunities for personal connection based on teamwork, as well as an athletic outlet for MPs and the wider community.



This year, so far, football opponents for the Subang FC team have included Balai Police Subang, Malaysian Debt Ventures, and Bomba Subang Jaya. At the end of June, the MP team will face against the Canadian, American, and Mexican embassies in a game celebrating the World Cup. January 6 Ayer Hitam Forest Reserve

On 6 January, YB Wong Chen issued a press statement regarding the 169 acres of land near the Ayer Hitam Forest Reserve. YB stated that the Selangor State Government has not responded to his request made 16 December 2025 for information about the history and transactions



regarding the lands, despite the letter stipulating that details be provided within 14 days. As such, a reminder letter was issued giving the state government a further 14 days to provide a formal response.

January 20 Ayer Hitam Forest Reserve

Following no response after 14 days from the Selangor State Government, YB Wong Chen called for a press conference to present findings conducted on his own initiative, identifying approximately 139 acres of land out of the reported 169. Through the search, conducted with NAPIC, it was revealed that there were 2 transactions, one on 21 September 2012 and another on 5 August 2019, almost 7 years later.

January 30 Podcast with Rafizi

YB Wong Chen appeared as a guest on Rafizi Ramli's podcast, Podcast Yang Berhenti Menteri #33: Skandal Yang Belum Selesai.



February 6 Interview with Sinar Daily

YB sat down with Sinar Daily to talk about a variety of issues, among which were public safety concerns following attacks on Rafizi's son and Selangor FC footballer Faisal Halim, the separation of the portfolios of Prime Minister and Finance Minister, and the structural viability of Malaysia's target of 60% women in the workforce.



February 13 Suspension of the MACC Chief

YB Wong Chen along with YB Rafizi Ramli and YB Rodziah Ismail held a press conference calling for DAP and Amanah to press the Prime Minister to suspend the MACC chief commissioner Tan Sri Azam Baki and investigate allegations against him.

February 15 Speech on Azam Baki

YB gave an impromptu speech during the Tangkap Azam Baki rally, highlighting the need for action to be taken against the corporate mafia and corruption allegations against Tan Sri Azam Baki. YB also spoke on the importance of mandatory asset declaration for holders of public office such as the MACC chief commissioner.



February 23 Immediate suspension of the ratification process for the ART

YB Wong Chen along with 3 other MPs issued a joint press statement urging the Madani Government to immediately suspend all ratification steps and processes of

the ART, given that the US Supreme Court ruled that all the tariffs were unlawful; thus, so is the ART. A list of next steps that, in their opinion, the government should take was set out: instructing the Attorney General's Office to issue a legal opinion on the legality of the ART, keep Members of Parliament informed on the cost-benefit implications of the 15% Trump global tariffs as well as developments regarding the potential billions of dollars of tariff refunds, and take steps to ensure any Malaysian exporter asked to bear a portion of the tariffs are equally refunded.

March 2 Escalation of conflict in West Asia

YB Wong Chen in his capacity as Chair of the Parliamentary Select Committee on International Relations and International Trade issued a press statement along with the other members of the Committee, condemning the military strikes by the United States and Israel against Iran and the subsequent retaliatory attacks by Iran across parts of West Asia.

March 16 Nullification of the ART between Malaysia and the United States

YB Wong Chen, along with 7 other PKR MPs issued a joint press statement welcoming the statement made by the MITI Minister YB Johari Ghani that the ART signed between Malaysia and the United States had been nullified. They urged however, that the entire process concerning the ART must be handled transparently by the government, and scrutinised members of the PSSC on Trade and International Relations who had not attended the hearing sessions.

March 19 Malaysiakini Comments on US warships in Butterworth and selling rare earth to the US Pentagon

YB was asked by Malaysiakini to comment on the presence of US warships in Butterworth and plans on Lynas to sell rare earth to the US Pentagon. On the former, he opined that the government should have denied the berthing of the warships as it will create unnecessary security risks and uneasiness of the Muslim population especially during Ramadan. On the latter, his view was that the ART has not been ratified yet, thus the Lynas question is not part of the ART arrangement on rare earth.

March 27 Tollbooth on the Strait of Hormuz

YB was asked by Malaysiakini to comment on the 'tollbooth' implemented by Iran for the passage of ships in the Strait of Hormuz. YB provided the view that if the Government has to pay the toll then it has to publicly disclose this as taxpayers money is involved.





April 6 USJ1 Public Clinic

In an interview with SJ Echo, YB Wong Chen stated that the foundation work for the USJ1 public clinic was nearly done

April 16 Ayer Hitam forest reserve

YB Wong Chen along with YB Chua Wei Kiat issued a joint press statement regarding the 169 acres of land near the Ayer Hitam forest reserve. In it, they criticized the failure of the Selangor State Government to respond to three official letters seeking information about the land's history and transactions. YB Wong Chen reiterated that his independent investigation, conducted alongside NAPIC, showed that the land was sold at RM 13.80 per square foot, and invited the Selangor State Government to confirm and comment on this.

April 20 Implementation of TURAP

In a joint press statement alongside 9 other PKR MPs, YB raised concerns over the Ministry of Human Resources' proposal to introduce TURAP, a new foreign worker recruitment system developed by Bestinet Sdn Bhd, citing governance failures identified in its existing FWCMS system by The Public Accounts Committee and the Auditor General.

April 20 Interview with CiliSosMY

YB Wong Chen along with YB Wan Fayhsal sat down for a podcast/interview with CiliSosMY, of which the focus was on the upcoming 2027 election.



April 22 Speech at the Grand Finale for TangkapAzamBaki

YB was in attendance at the Grand Finale for TangkapAzamBaki and was one of 14 speakers. He spoke on the importance of separation of powers between the Attorney General and the Public Prosecutor, and the need for a transparent investigation process outside the interference of the Cabinet.



May 5 169 acres of land near the Ayer Hitam forest reserve

YB Wong Chen wrote an article for SJ Echo on the subject matter of the lands near Ayer Hitam forest reserve, detailing the chronology and highlighting the price of the transaction, noting it to be too low.

May 6 The need for a special sitting in Parliament to discuss the Iran war

YB in his capacity as Chair of the PSSC of International Relations and International Trade issued a press statement calling for the Government to convene a special sitting of Parliament no later than early June 2026, to provide Parliament with the latest updates on the geopolitical situation and Malaysia's policy response.

May 8 Recent developments in Cuba

YB Wong Chen, along with 3 other MPs, issued a press statement on the recent developments in Cuba. They reaffirmed the importance of preserving Latin America and the Caribbean as a Zone of Peace, and the importance of continued dialogue, peaceful resolution of disputes and respect for international law and the sovereignty of states.

May 20 Regarding the development of electric vehicles in Malaysia

On the joint parliamentary committee meeting with PSSC on International Relations and International Trade along with the PSSC on Infrastructure, Transport and Communications , members called for a more comprehensive debate on the National Automotive Policy to balance the interests of the local automotive industry, while agreeing that the transition from petrol powered vehicles to electric vehicles will provide long term environmental benefits and reduce fiscal pressure from temporary fuel subsidies.



May 22 Blocking of MyKhas portal

YB Wong Chen issued a press statement on the sudden and unnotified denial of access of the MyKhas portal of the Subang Parliamentary Office. The disruption was discovered on Wednesday, 20th May, and the office was notified that access had been blocked on explicit instructions by superiors in Putrajaya. YB demanded that the Prime Minister's Department immediately restore access and provide an official, written explanation for this administrative block, raising questions of selective treatment and contradictions of Madani principles of a fair, transparent, and professional administration.

May 29 On the MyKhas portal and the 169 acres of land near the Ayer Hitam forest reserve



YB held a press conference on two issues: the continued denial to the MyKhas portal and the unresolved issue regarding the lands near Ayer Hitam. On the first issue, YB listed out the parties affected by the administrative block, which included schools, underprivileged communities, individuals with special needs, federal agencies and religious institutions. On the second issue, YB highlighted inconsistencies between the Selangor State Government's narrative that it had never intended for Perano to develop the lands and the Rancangan Tempatan MBSJ 2035, where the lands were classified as Planned Housing.

June 23 Proposed amendments to the AG-PP bill

YB Wong Chen along with 7 other MPs issued a joint press statement in relation to the proposed Constitutional amendments, stating that shortcomings were still present and much more work needed to be done for the bill to be deemed satisfactory. The need for a bipartisan Parliamentary scrutiny process of candidates, as well as mandatory complete asset declaration during nominations, were among the most significant reforms advocated.



June 29 Stance on TURAP

In a joint press statement, YB Wong Chen opposed the implementation of TURAP, citing the serious unresolved governance issues surrounding the existing FWCMS system. Further, questions of how TURAP was approved and why Bestinet was once again contracted to implement the system were raised.
